Cardiff's Community spirit to the fore at Wellfield Road

On Sunday evening, after Cardiff's, Wellfield Road was closed for the day to install 14 Birch trees and new traffic barriers, residents and retailers were woken up by police sirens just before midnight to find four of the trees had been snapped or severely damaged.

The trees and the barriers were put in place to enable businesses to trade safely, with wider pavements for customers, allowing people to socially distance from others.

The news that the trees had been damaged was a step too far for local resident Jordan Lee Wilson who is studying a Master's Degree in Urban Design at Cardiff University.

Jordan, 23, from Stafford in the West Midlands, took it upon himself to buy an Acer tree from a local retailer when he went for a walk and planted the tree in one of the now empty planters, with a plaque reading 'We Love Our New Trees XX.' A picture of the tree and plaque was posted on social media quickly gathering likes and shares and the public saluted Jordan's gesture.

Cllr Caro Wild, Cardiff Council Cabinet Member for Planning and Transport said: "After the upset and shock caused by the damage done to the new trees on Wellfield Rd, it was really heart-warming to see Jordan's goodwill gesture today and to see the positive reaction it was getting on social media. It's helped to create a real sense of community spirit towards the ongoing efforts to make improvements on Wellfield Road. I want to thank him for the gesture."

Other residents have also messaged the council via social media, offering to donate money towards the replacement trees which have already been ordered. The Council has been in contact with Jordan too, to thank him for his contribution and his message. Jordan's new Acer tree will stay on Wellfield Road in the current planter until the new Birch trees arrive, and in consultation with Jordan, the Acer tree will then be re-planted in a local park later in the year.

Digital support for Cardiff's teachers, children and young people

Cardiff Council is providing every teacher in Cardiff with up-to-date digital equipment, to assist them in the delivery of online and blended learning.

Joint funding from the Council and Welsh Government, has meant that 1,300 laptops have been delivered to teachers so far with a further 1,700 devices to be delivered over the next few weeks.

Cabinet Member for Education, Employment and Skills, Cllr Sarah Merry said: “This scheme will ensure that every teacher in the city is equipped with up-to-date digital equipment so that they can deliver online learning efficiently.

“We now know that education will need to be delivered through blended learning, combining online educational materials with traditional classroom methods. This further strengthens the importance that our workforce need good digital access going forward, even when schools reopen.”

In addition to digital provision for teachers, Cardiff Council has distributed just under 6500 digital devices including Chromebooks and iPads to children and young people in Cardiff who have been identified as digitally deprived. This is in addition to 2000 4G mobile broadband devices.

Since the Welsh Government guidance around the streaming of live lessons (synchronous learning) has recently changed and schools have now been provided with guidelines, the delivery of new Council owned devices, will also allow teachers to deliver live lessons, safely and proficiently. It will also provide them with the opportunity to enhance the use of technology in their lessons, create content and communicate with pupils and colleagues.

Cllr Merry added: “Since school closures, Cardiff Council has provided significant training to support schools to deliver online and distanced learning, including virtual teacher training in partnership with The open University. This training will continue to support teachers in delivering both synchronous and blended learning.”

Get a taste of Cardiff Food and Drink Festival delivered to your door

Cabinet Member for Culture and Leisure, Cllr Peter Bradbury said: “Cardiff Food and Drink Festival has been one of the highlights in Cardiff’s summer events calendar for more than 20 years, bringing crowds of food lovers into the city to sample some amazing produce and enjoy the buzz of the festival.

“Things are going to be a bit different this year, but we know that for many people a visit to this event marks the start of summer in Cardiff – and for the vendors at the festival it’s a fantastic opportunity for them to connect directly with customers.

“This virtual festival should be a great way to give people a flavour of what the Food and Drink Festival is all about, support the small businesses who rely at least in part, on the opportunities it offers, and help keep the festival spirit alive until next year.”

The Cardiff Food and Drink Festival website will launch this Friday at midday and run throughout July.

Dyma'r diweddaraf ar COVID-19 gan Gyngor Caerdydd: ysbryd Cymunedol Caerdydd yn dod i'r amlwg ar Wellfield Road; cymorth digidol i athrawon, blant a phobl ifanc Caerdydd; a beth am flasu Gŵyl Bwyd a Diod Caerdydd o garreg eich drws?

Ysbryd Cymunedol Caerdydd yn dod i'r amlwg ar Wellfield Road

Nos Sul, ar ôl i Wellfield Road yng Nghaerdydd gael ei chau am y diwrnod i osod 14 o goed bedw a rhwystrau traffig newydd, cafodd trigolion a manwerthwyr eu deffro gan seirenau'r heddlu ychydig cyn hanner nos i ddod o hyd i bedair o'r coed wedi eu torri neu eu difrodi'n ddifrifol.

Gosodwyd y coed a'r rhwystrau i alluogi busnesau i fasnachu'n ddiogel, gyda phalmentydd ehangach i gwsmeriaid, gan alluogi pobl i ymbellhau'n gymdeithasol oddi wrth eraill.

Roedd y newyddion bod y coed wedi'u difrodi gam yn rhy bell i breswlydd lleol Jordan Lee Wilson sy'n astudio gradd Meistr mewn Dylunio Trefol ym Mhrifysgol Caerdydd.

Aeth Jordan, 23, o Stafford yng Ngorllewin Canolbarth Lloegr, ati ei hun i brynu coeden Acer gan werthwr lleol wrth fynd am dro a phlannu'r goeden yn un o'r blychau plannu gwag sydd bellach yn wag, gyda phlac sy'n darllen 'Rydym yn Dwlu ar ein Coed Newydd XX. '

Cafodd llun o'r goeden a'r plac eu gosod ar y cyfryngau cymdeithasol gan gasglu hoffterau a rhaniadau yn gyflym a chroesawodd y cyhoedd yr hyn a wnaed Jordan. Dywedodd y Cynghorydd Caro Wild, Aelod Cabinet Cyngor Caerdydd dros Gynllunio a Thrafnidiaeth: "Ar ôl y gofid a'r sioc a achoswyd gan y difrod a wnaed i'r coed newydd ar Wellfield Road, roedd hi wir yn galonogol gweld arwydd ewyllys da Jordan heddiw a gweld yr ymateb cadarnhaol a gafodd ar y cyfryngau cymdeithasol. Mae wedi helpu i greu gwir deimlad o ysbryd cymunedol tuag at yr ymdrechion

parhaus i wneud gwelliannau ar Wellfield Road. Rwyf am ddiolch iddo am yr arwydd.”

Mae trigolion eraill hefyd wedi anfon negeseuon i'r Cyngor drwy'r cyfryngau cymdeithasol, gan gynnig rhoi arian tuag at y coed newydd sydd eisoes wedi'u harchebu.

Mae'r Cyngor wedi bod mewn cysylltiad â Jordan hefyd, i ddiolch iddo am ei gyfraniad a'i neges. Bydd coeden Acer newydd Jordan yn aros ar Wellfield Road yn y ddysgl bresennol nes i'r coed bedw newydd gyrraedd, ac mewn ymgynghoriad â Jordan, bydd y goeden Acer wedyn yn cael ei ail-blannu mewn parc lleol yn ddiweddarach yn y flwyddyn.

Cymorth digidol i athrawon, blant a phobl ifanc Caerdydd

Mae Cyngor Caerdydd yn rhoi'r offer digidol diweddaraf i bob athro yng Nghaerdydd i'w helpu i ddarparu dysgu ar-lein a chyfunol.

Mae arian ar y cyd gan y Cyngor a Llywodraeth Cymru wedi prynu 1,300 o liniaduron i athrawon hyd yma gyda 1,700 o ddyfeisiau pellach yn cael eu rhoi dros yr wythnosau i ddod.

Yn ogystal â rhoi gliadiuron i athrawon, mae Cyngor Caerdydd wedi dosbarthu bron 6500 o declynnau digidol gan gynnwys Chromebooks ac iPads i blant a phobl ifanc yng Nghaerdydd sydd wedi cael eu hadnabod yn rhai sy'n dioddef amddifadedd digidol. Mae hyn ar ben 2000 o ddyfeisiau band eang symudol 4G.

Dwedodd yr Aelod Cabinet dros Addysg, Cyflogaeth a Sgiliau, y Cynghorydd Sarah Merry: “Bydd y cynllun hwn yn sicrhau bod pob athro yn y ddinas ag offer digidol modern er mwyn iddo ddarparu dysgu ar-lein yn effeithlon.

“Rydym yn gwybod y bydd angen cyflwyno addysg trwy ddysgu cyfunol, gan gyfuno deunyddiau addysgol ar-lein â dulliau ystafell ddosbarth traddodiadol. Mae hyn yn cryfhau ymhellach y pwysigrwydd bod angen mynediad digidol da ar ein gweithlu wrth symud ymlaen, hyd yn oed pan fydd ysgolion yn ailagor.

Gan fod arweiniad Llywodraeth Cymru ar ffrydio gwersi byw (dysgu cydamserol) wedi newid yn ddiweddar a bod ysgolion wedi derbyn canllawiau erbyn hyn, bydd rhoi'r dyfeisiau newydd y mae'r Cyngor yn berchen arnynt hefyd yn galluogi athrawon i gynnal gwersi byw, yn ddiogel ac yn fedrus. Bydd hefyd yn rhoi'r cyfle iddynt wella'r defnydd o dechnoleg yn eu gwersi, creu cynnwys a chyfathrebu â disgyblion a chydweithwyr.

Ychwanegodd y Cynghorydd Merry: “Ers i ysgolion gael eu cau, mae Cyngor Caerdydd wedi cynnig hyfforddiant sylweddol i gefnogi ysgolion i ddarparu dysgu ar-lein ac o bell, gan gynnwys hyfforddiant rhithwir i athrawon mewn partneriaeth â'r Brifysgol Agored. Bydd yr hyfforddiant hwn yn parhau i gefnogi athrawon i ddarparu dysgu cydamserol a chyfunol.”

Beth am flasau Gŵyl Bwyd a Diod Caerdydd o garreg eich drws?

Bob blwyddyn, daw mwy na 100 o gynhyrchwyr crefftus, masnachwyr bwyd annibynnol a gwerthwyr bwyd stryd i osod stondinau ym Mae Caerdydd ar benwythnos cyntaf mis Gorffennaf ar gyfer Gŵyl Bwyd a Diod Caerdydd - ond eleni caiff y bwyd (ynghyd â rhywfaint o'r profiad gŵyl) ei ddsbarthu yn syth wrth eich drws.

Bydd [gwefan newydd yr ŵyl](#) yn cynnig ryseitiau a marchnad ar-lein lle gall ymwelwyr archebu amrywiaeth o fwyd a diod lleol a rhyngwladol o safon uchel - pethau megis Cacennau blasus, marinadau, olewau â blas, piclau, jin a seidr arbenigol a mwy - yn uniongyrchol gan y gwneuthurwyr.

Dyweddodd yr Aelod Cabinet dros Ddiwylliant a Hamdden, y Cynghorydd Peter Bradbury: "Mae Gŵyl Bwyd a Diod Caerdydd wedi bod yn un o uchafbwyntiau yng nghalendr digwyddiadau'r haf Caerdydd ers dros 20 mlynedd, gan ddod â llu o bobl sy'n dwlu ar fwyd i'r ddinas i brofi cynnyrch anhygoel a mwynhau bwrlwm yr ŵyl.

"Mae pethau'n mynd i fod ychydig yn wahanol eleni, ond fe wyddom i lawer o bobl fod ymweliad â'r digwyddiad hwn yn nodi dechrau'r haf yng Nghaerdydd – ac i'r gwerthwyr yn yr ŵyl, mae'n gyfle gwych i gysylltu'n uniongyrchol â chwsmeriaid.

"Dylai'r ŵyl rithwir hon fod yn ffordd wych o roi blas i bobl o'r hyn y mae'r ŵyl bwyd a diod yn ei wneud, cefnogi'r busnesau bach sy'n dibynnu o leiaf yn rhannol, ar y cyfleoedd sydd ar gynnig, a helpu i gadw ysbryd yr ŵyl yn fyw tan y flwyddyn nesaf."

Bydd gwefan Gŵyl Bwyd a diod Caerdydd yn cael ei lansio ddydd Gwener yma am hanner dydd a bydd ar gael drwy gydol mis Gorffennaf.
